









Who Are We?

Reeltime Music exists to create and provide opportunities for disadvantaged young people in the creative industries which have an impact on their personal, social and career skills. The project was started in 1997 and opened its state of the art recording and rehearsal facility in 2003.

What We Do? Music Youth Groups

Our tutors deliver music youth groups that meet weekly. These groups get local young people involved in creative activities that involve working in a group setting.

Tailored Projects

In conjunction with partners such as North Lanarkshire Council and Action for Children, Reeltime designs and delivers tailored projects to suit the outcomes of various local agencies.

Volunteering Opportunities

We offer volunteering opportunities which build valuable skills and experience. These range from supporting our youth music groups and events to assisting with recording sessions and office administration.

Community Music Workshops

Reeltime's experienced tutors deliver a unique blend of fun, youth work, multimedia and music instruction. We offer this to young people with a range of barriers and disadvantages. To do this we work closely with a network of local partners including Community Learning & Development, North Lanarkshire Education Department and other public and third sector partners.

Recording & Rehearsal Studio

The studio facility offers young people an affordable way to practice and perform their music. This creative space has industry standard recording and rehearsal equipment. Young people also receive information and advice from our friendly and helpful staff.

Why Do We Do It?

Getting involved in making music and media has a whole range of benefits for young people, such as improved wellbeing and increased engagement in learning.

Put simply, we want to inspire disadvantaged young people through creative activities.





Review of the Year



Introduction

The Reeltime Board of Trustees are proud to present the main achievements of our charity over the past year. We hope you will enjoy reading about the impact of our work.

In the past twelve months we've delivered a wide and varied programme of activities. This comprised of a small number of in-house projects complimented by a wide range of work with our partners.

Over 950 young people took part in our activities. These included workshops, live events, music groups and training courses. 19 young volunteers supported and delivered important activities. In doing so, this had an impact on Reeltime Music, local young people and their own development.

Reeltime Projects

The Young Sound

The Young Sound groups blend the best of youth work and the creative industries. To do this, young people develop creative and personal skills in regular weekly sessions. This year both groups participated in a variety of valuable activities. These included instrumental tuition, group activities, media projects, live events, trips and workshops.

Partnership Projects Pre-Employability

Activity Agreement

North Lanarkshire Council runs the Activity Agreement programme, targeting those not in employment, education or training. The programme aims to help young people make choices about themselves and their future. Activities include music, media, group activities and more. Feedback from the young people involved continues to be excellent. Many report enjoying the atmosphere, learning new skills and thinking differently.

Health and Wellbeing

FeelsFM

SeeMe Scotland's campaign encourages young people to talk about mental health through music and emotions. We engaged with two high schools and our weekly groups to create a social media campaign leading to a live music event with local bands bringing a mental health twist to their set.

Scotch Whisky Action Fund

This year, we worked with two secondary schools to think creatively about how to reduce alcohol related harm. To do this, tutors partnered with Landed Peer Education Service to deliver eight sessions in each school. During the sessions the young people had the opportunity to come up with persuasive messages about responsible use of alcohol. They also got hands on with a variety of musical instruments and media equipment to create a video of their work.

Education

Skills Academy

Skills Academy offer an alternative secondary education programme designed for those who feel mainstream education does not meet their needs. Reeltime supports the programme through weekly music and media based activities. Tutors use a collaborative approach, and young people always have a choice in the direction of learning. The programme has raised attendance and attainment for many of the young people involved.

Willowbank School

Wilowbank School offers support to young people who display high levels of anxiety and vulnerability. During their weekly workshop, young people take part in individual and group focused activities that are tailored to each persons interests and strengths. Tutors use a nurturing approach which helps young people overcome barriers to learning, create opportunities for success and promote engagement and enjoyment in their education.



Reducing stigma is at the core of all mental health improvement work. We were delighted to support Reeltime, who took the FeelsFM campaign and used it to engage young people and get them speaking about mental health.

We loved the videos the young people created as part of the social media campaign, and the continued effort to encourage young people to think about mental health and music. The gig was the perfect culmination of their campaign, with some amazing local bands and singers performing a mix of their own songs and some of our FeelsFM favourites.

Celebration of Youth Music Project

The Celebration of Youth Music Project is an example of new approaches to learning. Eight primary schools had the opportunity to write, record and perform a song about a particular theme. Along the way they interacted with various songwriters, composers and Reeltime staff. Each group recorded their song on location, enjoying the experience of singing and recording. A showcase performance was held in Motherwell Concert Hall. Each school donated the proceeds of CD sales to their chosen charities.

Community Music

Shotts GBT

This year we continued working in partnership with Shotts Healthy Living Centre. Both a younger and older group worked on a variety of projects. These projects encourage the building of musical, personal and social development skills. Also, for some of the young people involved it was their first experience of informal music making. Activities have included making music videos and mini-albums.

Seasonal Projects

This year we also delivered a variety of short term and seasonal projects. These included working with voluntary sector partners such as Barnardos and the Virtual Schools Project. We also worked alongside our public sector partners to deliver a wide range of activities. These included school transition programmes, local community groups and targeted youth projects.

Events

Reeltime Music held or participated in eight events this year. Key events included the FeelsFM concert hosted at the GLO Centre in Motherwell town centre and the Access to the Creative Industries showcase in Glasgow.

Reeltime groups also organised a number of smaller events in support of a number of good causes.

Volunteering, Training and Organisational Development

Providing volunteering opportunities is essential to the running of Reeltime Music. This year, 19 volunteers contributed over 1100 volunteer hours.

This supported our activities in workshops, studio recordings and at board level.

Training and development is another essential part of Reeltime Music. We believe that lifelong learning is a valuable and rewarding choice, and seek to model this where possible. This year we provided a range of opportunities for staff through a mix of in-house and external training.



"At Reeltime I am always treated with respect, kindness and equality. I get along well with all the staff, some have battled certain things that youth today still do. And that's pretty inspiring.

It has helped me understand that starting out and working your way up is better than being scared you're going to be awful and never trying.

From the first time I walked in, everyone seemed calm, it doesn't matter what you look or sound like, what music you like or what instrument you play.

Without Reeltime I wouldn't have made certain friends, I wouldn't have the skillset that I do today and I certainly wouldn't have the opportunity to do what I love as frequently."

"The course dramatically changed my musical ability and confidence. It's the little things you learn on the course that really help me to think about learning and coping with challenges differently.




























How YOU can get involved


