Who Are We?

Reeltime Music exists to create and provide opportunities for disadvantaged young people in the creative industries which will have an impact on their personal, social and career skills. The project was started in 1997 and opened its state of the art recording and rehearsal facility in 2003.

What We Do?

Recording & Rehearsal Studio

The studio facility offers young people an affordable way to practice and perform their music. This creative space has industry standard recording and rehearsal equipment. Young people also receive information and advice from our friendly and helpful staff.

Community Music Workshops

Reeltime's experienced tutors deliver a unique blend of fun, youth work, multimedia and music instruction. We offer this to young people with a range of barriers and disadvantage. To do this we work closely with a network of local partners including Community Learning & Development, North Lanarkshire Education Department and other public and third sector partners.

Tailored Projects

In conjunction with partners such as North Lanarkshire Council and Action for Children, Reeltime designs and delivers tailored projects to suit the outcomes of various local agencies.

Volunteering Opportunities

We offer volunteering opportunities which build valuable skills and experience. These range from supporting our youth music groups and events to assisting with recording sessions and office administration.

Music Youth Groups

Our tutors deliver music youth groups that meet weekly. These groups get local young people involved in creative activities that involve working in a group setting.

Why Do We Do It?

We have found that by providing an informal service, music is a great way to break down barriers, learn new skills, increase aspirations and develop a more active lifestyle.

By promoting an environment where young people can work with friendly, knowledgeable, trained staff to learn about things they want to learn, young people can learn about the value of creativity, growth and participation.



Review of the Year

Introduction

The Reeltime Board of Trustees are proud to present the main achievements of our charity over the past year. We hope you will enjoy reading about the impact of our work.

In the past twelve months we've delivered a wide and varied programme of activities. This comprised of a small number of in-house projects complimented by a wide range of work with our partners.

Over 1,100 young people took part in our activities. These included music workshops, live events, music groups and training courses.

24 young volunteers supported and delivered important activities. In doing so, this had an impact on Reeltime Music, local young people and their own development.

Reeltime Projects

The Young Sound

The Young Sound groups blend the best of youth work and the creative industries. To do this, young people develop creative and personal skills in regular weekly sessions.

This year both groups participated in a variety of valuable activities. These included instrumental tuition, group activities, media projects, live events, trips and workshops. Young people told us what they wanted from this project. We then introduced a three stage model that leads to volunteering and peer education.

Partnership Projects

Pre-Employability

Activity Agreement

North Lanarkshire Council runs the activity agreement programme for young people aged 16-29. It targets those not in employment, education or training. The aim of the programme is to help young people make choices about themselves and their future. To do this, we work with local centres to provide support through a variety of activities. These include music, media, group activities and more. Feedback from the young people involved continues to be excellent. Many report enjoying the atmosphere, learning new skills and thinking differently.

The Prince's Trust

We were delighted this year to deliver a programme with The Princes Trust. Get Started with Music is a week long programme for young people aged 16-25 who are out of work, education or training. Participants have the opportunity to meet new people and develop skills in music, music production and employability.

Health and Wellbeing

Soundminds

Soundminds is a youth led project which promotes positive mental health messages in creative ways. It does this as part of the Scottish Mental Health Arts and Film Festival. The steering group excelled themselves this year by holding a youth music event in Motherwell town centre. Volunteers provided workshops and local bands performed live. The group also interviewed members of the public about their views on mental health.

Scotch Whisky Action Fund

This year, we worked with ten secondary schools to think creatively about how to reduce alcohol related harm. To do this, tutors partnered with Landed Peer Education Service to deliver eight sessions in each school. During the sessions the young people had the opportunity to come up with persuasive messages about responsible use of alcohol. They also got hands on with a variety of musical instruments and media equipment to create a video of their work.

Young Parents Music Project

This year we partnered with McOPERA to deliver an innovative early years project for young parents. Delivered across two eight week blocks, parents worked with Reeltime staff for the first hour of each session and McOPERA staff for the second. Each group learned about the benefits of play with their child as well as working together to complete their own creative project. The McOPERA session modelled to parents examples of songs and play which can be done at home.

REACH Lanarkshire

REACH Lanarkshire Autism provides practical support to individuals and families living with an autism spectrum condition. Reeltime tutors worked in partnership with REACH this year to deliver a ten week music and media project. The young people involved had the chance to try out a variety of musical instruments, complete creative challenges and complete a short project of their choice.

Action for Children

We were delighted to have the chance to work with our partners at Action for Children again this year.

Tutors delivered four eight week projects, which gave young people some time away from caring responsibilities. The creative music and media activities helped to reduce feelings of isolation, built new skills and raised awareness of local young carers support services.

Education

Supported Access to Learning & Employability

Supported Access to Learning and Employability offers an alternative education programme. It is designed for those who feel secondary, mainstream education does not meet their needs. Reeltime supports the programme by offering weekly music and media based activities. To do this, tutors use a collaborative approach, and young people always have a choice in the direction of their learning. The programme has raised attendance and attainment for many of the young people involved.



Celebration of Youth Music Project

The Celebration of Youth Music Project is an example of new approaches to learning. Eight primary schools had the opportunity to write, record and perform a song about a particular theme. Along the way they interacted with various songwriters, composers and Reeltime staff. Each group recorded their song on location, enjoying the experience of singing and recording. A showcase performance was held in Motherwell Concert Hall. Each school donated the proceeds of CD sales to their chosen charities

Community Music

Coltness Music Project

The Coltness Music Project aims to bring informal music making to young people in and around Coltness High School. It targets young people who enjoy music but would not normally access the music department. The project involves regular after school workshops delivered by Reeltime tutors. These workshops link in with band nights held throughout the year. HMle highlighted the project as an example of innovative practice in March 2014.

Shotts GBT

This year we continued working in partnership with Shotts Healthy Living Centre. Both a younger and older group worked on a variety of projects. These projects encourage the building of musical, personal and social development skills. Also, for some of the young people involved it was their first experience of informal music making. Activities have included making music videos and mini-albums. The groups also performed live at events and for friends and family.

Seasonal Projects

This year we also delivered a variety of short term and seasonal projects. These included working with voluntary sector partners such as The Teenage Cancer Trust and Spina Bifida Hydrocephalus Scotland. We also worked alongside our public sector partners to deliver a wide range of activities. These included school transition programmes and targeted youth projects.

Events

Key events this year included the Rock the House event in June, Soundminds in October and the November Jam event in November. Other events were held in partnership with a number of local organisations. These included North Lanarkshire CL&D, Shotts GBT among others.

Volunteering, Training and Organisational Development

Providing volunteering opportunities is essential to the running of Reeltime Music. This year, 24 volunteers contributed over 2700 volunteer hours. This supported our activities in workshops, studio recordings, through our community band My Generation, and at board level.

Training and development is another essential part of Reeltime Music. We believe that lifelong learning is a valuable and rewarding choice, and seek to model this where possible. This year we provided a range of opportunities for staff through a mix of in-house and external training.

Conclusion

As you have have seen from this summary review, our small team has accomplished a lot in the past year. It takes commitment, effort, planning and collaboration to deliver such results.

We are indebted to all our staff and volunteers for their dedication and hard work.
